Tina and I will never forget when we were driving to the Air Force Memorial and Kaz was eating his lunch and chatting with Tina when the bus passed the edge of Arlington National Cemetery. He stopped talking, put down his sandwich and took off his hat.

I recall Frank telling me about owning a bunch of antique fire trucks. I didn't know whether to believe him or not! But when he passed away, several of those restored fire trucks joined us in the funeral procession.

We got to enjoy the hospitality



of Charlie and his wife, and when I visited Ralph in his home, I saw what a highly decorated soldier he had been in WWII – though he never gave a hint of it on the flight.

The Honor Flight experience is more than a dinner and a trip to DC. It's the intersection of lives that will never be the same again. Thanks for your part in making it happen.
