"Your Favorite Memories of Never Forgotten Honor Flight Trip:"

Donald Washeb (Veteran): "How smooth everything went that day and **all the people that really care what we did for our country**. From the start of the day early morning until late evening everyone looked out for us and made sure we all had what we needed. The people that helped out were great. **My wife also enjoyed her day. It was nice she had something to do while I was away.**"

Phyllis Ducklow (Veteran): "**My husband Robert passed away July 29, 2014. This was the last trip he took before he succumbed to cancer.** Because he never was in combat, he never felt he was entitled to any recognition for his two-year active duty in the Dental Corps. He stayed 28 years in the Army Reserve. This trip to Washington DC in 2013 **made him realize how important his job was** as a member of the support troops. A former combat soldier and career officer made him realize that. It was a marvelous experience for him, and he told every vet "Go!" if you can. I believe this trip was one of the highlights of his entire 30 years of service as an Army dentist. **Thank you, Never Forgotten Honor Flight, for the joy you gave him the last year of his life.**"

Chester Waller (Veteran): "**Chet Waller is deceased. He died January 28, 2013. His trip was one of the most rewarding experiences. He never ceased talking about it until the end. Thank you for making his day so wonderful.**"

Denise Horn (Guardian): "**My dad can't stop talking about the trip.** He said after we got home that night, "**Thanks for talking me into going.**" The greeting we received at the airport, and the number of people there, was unbelievable! All of you volunteers are the best! You have developed a very well-run organization. Every person we met was great and made the vets feel special. **I feel so blessed to have been able to go on the Honor Flight with my dad.** Thanks again for honoring the veterans for the last five years."

Harley Lous (Veteran): "The short time it took to fly there after takeoff, and **I got to visit my brother's grave. He has been in Arlington since 1960.** I've been to Arlington four times. The last time before this trip was 1999, to also visit my father and mother's grave at Arlington. It changed a lot. Everything was wonderful."

Lori Schlais (Guardian): "**My dad did not tell many people** he was going on the Honor Flight. So when mail call happened, **he assumed he would not receive mail.** Well, a classroom of children from my sister's Texas school sent notes, relatives wrote letters, friends from the senior center and my dad's "Young at Heart" church group wrote notes. He was overwhelmed by everyone's kind words."

Marilyn Baumann (Veteran): "**My husband passed away May 26, 2014. We talked about his trip a lot. He was buried in his Honor Flight shirt.**"

Ronald Hahn (Veteran): "The water cannon salutes from the firetrucks at Wausau Airport and at Reagan National in Washington DC. The changing of the guard at Arlington National Cemetery, and **the sergeant of the guard coming out to speak to us after the ceremony**. This is a rare occurrence from what I understand. And finally, a very special gift given to me by Jan Wendtland as a memorial of our flight."

Laura Schulte (Guardian): "The **welcome** for the veterans **at Dulles** – so incredible and wonderful! **Spending the day with my grandfather and his brother in DC.** Grandpa and Uncle Bill both **talked about it from that day until they died.**"

Bill Schulte (Guardian): "It was such an honor to escort a WWII veteran and hear his stories. I am a retired veteran and especially cherish these memories. We **continue our contact** at Christmas with my veteran and his wife."

Joseph Brayer (Veteran): "When getting off the plane, the first person to greet me was my niece, which I had not seen for 20 years. She brought me 4 dozen chocolate chip cookies that I passed around the bus, which was fun."

Kim Susens (Guardian): "Walking through the **crowd of children** at the WWII Memorial. They all shook the hands of each veteran and thanked them – it was very moving. The Army general that just happened to be at Reagan Airport while we were waiting to return to Wausau. He was so genuinely interested in the veterans' stories, and greeted each one of them. Being with my veteran all day. Hal was amazing. We had a lot of fun. Spending time with him was priceless – learning about his service and witnessing the emotion of all the veterans will forever be in my memory, especially at mail call. The welcome home and water cannon salutes – wow! Thank you very much for the opportunity."

Jim Amo (Guardian): "It was my wife's dream to **have her dad go** on the Old Glory Honor Flight. **Little did we know 3 months later she would be diagnosed with cancer and pass away before him** in February 2013. We took a few more steps and she said, "This is your day."
